The topic for my input to our second News Letter will be **STANDARDISATION**.

For years the Umpire Committees of the member countries could not agree on how to manage changes to the IJF Playing Rules within the same year. With close cooperation between the member countries, during the 2019/20 season, a process was put into place to solve the said problem. Unfortunately, the process was not followed this season in order to test it in full.

The second standardisation was the training of umpires at all levels, especially those members that are nominated by their Umpire Committees through the EXCO of the Country Jukskei Federation.

This was followed by the standardisation of the training of the Coaches at all levels. With thanks to Jukskei SA (JSA) for the training material. The agreement is only for material up to Provincial level. JSA is willing to assist with the training at all levels. Countries to liaise directly with JSA.

Throughout the world, the playing fields for international competitions must meet certain minimum standards. Isn't it time that we must also look into it, especially the courts which are utilized for the tests? I specifically would like to point out the type of sand/soil that is utilized in the sandpit.

To standardise the type of sand for the courts' sandpits for purposes of test matches, would mean that the quality of elite players will be showcased. Is it not what the spectators would like to see?

The counterargument could be that top players should be able to practise playing on any kind of sand. Yes, I fully agree, but then you would not see the real quality of the top players.

The question is, what would the minimum standard be, silica or plaster sand? Plaster sand has different variations, which one will be acceptable?

I would like to leave this thought with you until such time that we can have an in-depth discussion about the standardisation of the test courts.

May the new season be better than the past two seasons.







#### **Gert Aggenbach**

(8 April 1951 – 22 March 2021)

In a nutshell: The late Gert Aggenbach still is a synonym of JUKSKEI NAMIBIA in all its facets: a man who placed great emphasis on family; charity was near to his heart; his business sense was exceptional. In short: The jukskei community has lost a man with courage and determination.

Gert was born on 8 April 1951 in the Gibeon district in Namibia and grew up and went to school in Tsumeb. He started his jukskei career when he was ten years old and his mother was a Springbok jukskei player.




His initially resided in Swakopmund while assisting to develop the Rössing Uranium Mine and this is where he met his future wife, Koekoes. In 1996 they relocated to Windhoek.

Gert was further known for the installation of especially cell phone infrastructure in Namibia after he had established Aggenbach Technical Services in Windhoek. This Afrikaans folk music lover could also sing the Südwesterlied from full chest and he had a farm near Maltahöhe.

On another front: Gert Aggenbach was also a jukskei player to be reckoned with. He represented Namibia from 1988 to 1996 as a Mens A-player (Kopersbond) and he also represented Namibia in 1994 against the Springboks.

From 1991 to 1997 he was chairperson and vice-chairperson of the Namibian Jukskei Board and from 2013 to 2017 the President. Until his death on 22 March 2021 he was the Director: Finance of Namibia Jukskei.



#### **Participation and Covid-19**

The last International Jukskei event was the 2019 SA Junior Championships in Kroonstad.

It was further the first time ever that the Indigenous teams of Provinces also participated and they enjoyed the game of jukskei in Kroonstad.


Jukskei South Africa subsidised the accommodation of all the players which was very much appreciated.

# **Contents of the Umpire's Toolkit**

As promised, I will unpack my toolkit and show you what is in an umpire's toolkit to make a fair and good decision. Do you know what we call them and how to use the pieces?



**Umpire Toolkit** 

Item	Description
1	Umpire Tool Kit
2	Vertical Level
3	Calipers (Stainless Steel
4	Feeler gauge
5	Long supporters
6	Short Supporters
7	Glass head pins
8	Temporary adhesive
9	Permanent Markers (Black, Blue & Red)
10	Adjustable Caliper (Small)
11	Adjustable Caliper (Large)
12	Small Level
13	Whistle
14	Pin Specification Gauge
15	Pin position Gauge (Small)
16	Pin position Gauge (Large)
17	Small paintbrush
18	Utility knife



Item 2 Vertical Level: to see that the peg is standing up straight.



Item 3 Caliper: to measure the distance between the 2 skeys and see which one is closest to the peg.



Item 4 Feeler gauge: to measure the distance between the 2 skeys where a caliper will not fit



Items 5 and 6 Long and short supporters to support the blue skey from rolling. Item 7 Blue Glass head pins in the green skey to keep the string straight.
